Msgr James Moroney - *A New Translation for a New Roman Missal*, www.romanmissal.us/ by Msgr. Jim Moroney, executive director of Vox Clara. This resource is available online and is a helpful guide for bishops, priests, deacons, seminarians, and the laity, providing a fertile ground in which to develop a new and insightful appreciation for the Sacred Liturgy and the rich, authentic text of the new English translation, as well as serving as a useful tool for pastoral preparation and catechesis of the lay faithful. Gives a historical background to the Missal and recites Eucharistic Prayers I – IV. The material is available online together with discussion questions for small groups.

- **Mystical Body, Mystical Voice: Encountering Christ in the Words of the Mass**, by Fr. Douglas Martis and Christopher Carstens. This book uses the texts of the third typical edition of the Roman Missal to illustrate how the liturgy is enriched and the Church's understanding of the Second Vatican Council is deepened through the translation of the Missal. Grounded in sacramental theology and the liturgical rites of the Church, this accessible book begins by exploring the sacramental nature of the liturgy and its symbolic use of words. It then continues to give a brief history of translation of the missal, an examination of the texts of the Mass in their sacramental meaning and tips for liturgical catechesis. This is a formation resource that includes the material from the popular individual pamphlets by the same name, but assembled into one single booklet for participants with an available leader's edition. The leader's guide consists of eight sessions (each includes discussion questions and "points to ponder").

Father O'Neill was well versed in modern scriptural exegesis and the Fathers of the Church; he knew the works of St. Thomas Aquinas and he was very familiar with the "new theologians."
